







Chuckle from Friday Night @ 7:30 Baroque Festival


Norma asks, "What time period is the Baroque era?"

Congratulations to all of the students who challenged themselves to prepare for Baroque Festival and share their musicianship with a larger audience. One of the joys we teachers have is in introducing our students to great composers. But sometimes we may inadvertently give them the impression that all composers are dead. We have the opportunity at our next program to learn more about a living composer, only 39 years old, currently living in Spain. I had not heard of Marcos Fernandez-Barrero before, but in doing a little research I learned that he is an up-and-coming composer with many awards and commissions already accomplished. He was recently





commissioned by the Barcelona Symphony to write a symphonic work in homage to Leonard Bernstein and you can listen to an interview with Fernandez-Barrero here- https://www.marcos-fernandez.es/america/

His music is exciting and rhythmic, using many of the folk idioms of Spain, but still accessible. Our presenter, **Benita Rose**, has been studying his music in depth and will be presenting some of his piano works and making a comparison with more traditional composers, such as Chopin. Steinway Artist, Natsuki Fukasawa, has performed in Australia, Brazil, China, Denmark, England, Hong Kong, Israel, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, and the U.S. She is a recipient of the Best Chamber Music Recording of the Year from the Danish Music Awards.

Dr. Fukasawa teaches at both University of the Pacific Conservatory of Music and at UC Davis, and serves on the artist faculty for the Talis Festival and Academy in Bosnia and Orfeo Music Festival in the Italian Alps. She also enjoys nurturing young talents in her own private studio, where her students' accomplishments include appearances in the NPR show From the Top, winning top prizes in Chopin National Competition, MTAC Young Artist Guild, Philadelphia International Competition, and go on to pursue music in college.

Cynthia Ley speaks about CM:

Greetings everyone,

For those interested in the current state of affairs with in-person CM testing, I figured I would put together a report on what I've noticed as a teacher. First off, these are solely my opinions and do not represent CCMTAC nor MTAC for that matter.

This year, I had 3 CM students who decided to all do the in-person testing. One elected to go to Sacramento, while another two decided on going to San Jose. These are just pertaining to my observations for Sacramento.

First off, I know everyone's main contention point about the in-person CM is the cost. At \$230+, it's pricey. But given what I saw at Sacramento, I can see why it's needed. Assuming MTAC is following their rules of that all workers on site are considered employees (as opposed to volunteers), they had (if I remember correctly), 3 people at the check in desk. They were outside the waiting room in the cold in which, props to them for being able to stand the rain and cold.

Then, students were instructed to join parents and visitors in the waiting room. I know the instruction was given out that students should show up 40 min in person for warm up. However, it was odd that students really only needed to be there at best 20 minutes before. (That said, do show up 40 min prior according to the instructions.) In the waiting room, there were a couple of people attending to the waiting room. One was more acting as a monitor, another to guide checked in students to the locations they needed to be at such as the warm up room, evaluation room, and theory test room.

Now mind you, as a teacher, I couldn't see much. So, a lot of this is based on my student's experience after asking them how it was like. My student assumed that after checking in, she could warm up. However, she found out it was locked. Instead, someone told her that the warmup room would be open to her 10 minutes prior to her exam. (So, I'm not sure why 40 min. prior would be needed). The warmup room apparently did have an actual piano (so not a keyboard + headphones setup). That said, it seems the piano was just an upright piano. Tuning may have been not up to standard as my student said the sound was pretty different than my grand piano. So, this may be the practice pianos that colleges generally have as opposed to tuned baby or full grand pianos.

After she was taken into the evaluation room, apparently there were another two people. One was the evaluator while another was a helper of sorts. I don't know how many rooms were around for evaluations, but given within 20 minutes of time, I had seen 3-4 students return, I'd assume there were minimum 4 rooms functioning at the same time.

After my student returned from her evaluations, the same lady in charge of bringing students to rooms asked for the check in voucher. Apparently, the evaluator had taken it though and forgot to return it. So, my suggestion is to make sure to print 2 copies of the check in voucher in case needed. The lady in charge, however, was able to return to the evaluation room to retrieve my student's check in voucher.

Just before she guided my student to the theory room, she did ask whether my student brought her own headphones (which she did given the instructions). My student said yes, but then it seems that the theory room did have a few headphones of their own. The lady said it was my student's choice whether she wanted to use her own or to borrow one that was available. So I suppose, it's not game over if you forget the headphones, but I'm not sure if this would necessarily translate to other venues. My student also noted that the devices for the test were laptops. (So take that cost into consideration of the current in person cost). I don't know how many laptops were available at one time, but technology isn't cheap.

My student otherwise had a positive experience. She quite enjoyed the process too.

My one complaint I guess (aside from price), is that I do wish there was more signage and notice. Parking instructions were given extremely late for this first batch of Sacramento students. So in turn, when I arrived at the venue, I parked





at the wrong parking lot/at the wrong side of campus. There were no signs to guide so I just had to figure my way around after texting the mother of my student.

Parking instructions are out already for the San Jose location so if you are going to join your student on site, definitely check that out.

Otherwise, the entire process was pretty smooth for my student.
